



UNITED NEIGHBORHOODS ADVISORY BOARD

Leaders from neighborhood councils who provide ideas and input to the Board of County Commissioners.



NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCILS

Neighbors in charge of a \$25,000 fund that creates community and virtual neighborhood events. Elected neighborhood group-leader representatives.



NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS

Neighbors connecting to create community virtual events and looking to advocate for their neighborhood.



RESIDENT

Attend a virtual neighborhood event, join a neighborhood group, and/or create a neighborhood group.

UNITED NEIGHBORHOODS ADVISORY BOARD

This is a five-member resident board that provides neighborhood and community input to various departments in Adams County and the Board of County Commissioners. Each board member is elected/appointed by their Neighborhood Council and each member serves a three-year term, as long as they continue to reside in the Neighborhood District they represent.



what does the

ADVISORY BOARD DO?

- ▶ Provide public input on upcoming county initiatives like capital improvement projects, zoning considerations, developments, public art, etc.
- Represent Neighborhood Districts at Town Halls and public hearings.
- ▶ Make suggestions for neighborhood areas and provide input on neighborhood plans.
- ▶ Update Neighborhood Councils on upcoming improvements.
- ▶ Generate ideas for community events.
- Commit to learning about county processes and inform neighborhood about county processes.
- ▶ Work with CSWB Neighborhoods Coordinator in creating neighborhood snapshots for Town Halls.
- Engage businesses and local organizations around community events and needs.

NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCILS AND DISTRICTS

There are five Neighborhood Council Districts in Adams County. There can be any number of neighborhood groups within neighborhood council districts. Neighborhood groups determine who is part of the Neighborhood Council by electing or appointing a representative and alternate from their group to become part of the Neighborhood Council. Each neighborhood council oversees a community fund to allocate funding for neighborhood initiatives.

what does the

NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL DO?

- ▶ Serve as experts of their neighborhood. They understand the identity, culture, strengths, and challenges in their neighborhood zone.
- ▶ Work with the Community Safety & Well-Being Department to create the neighborhood Policy Agenda establishing the neighborhood identity and opportunities and needs residents in the zone have identified. The Policy Agenda is a guiding document for both staff and leadership.
- ▶ Coordinate joint community events, highlight the efforts of neighborhood groups in their neighborhood zone, and maintain the community calendar for their neighborhood zone.
- ▶ Coordinate with the Adams County Neighborhood Liaison to ensure council pages and event calendars are updated.
- ▶ Neighborhood council members also appoint one representative from each district to be part of the United Neighborhoods Advisory Board.

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS

A group of community members who come together to share ideas, organize, and work together to positively affect the neighborhood. Members can include residents, business owners, and local organizations within a neighborhood. By forming a neighborhood group, neighbors create a unified purpose around a common set of goals. These groups are open to both homeowners and renters who reside in the neighborhoods.





types of GROUPS

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUP A voluntary group of neighbors who act as one to preserve and improve their neighborhood. This group may choose to respond to concerns or provide input to county processes that provide benefits and improvement to their neighborhood.

NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION A neighborhood group is formalized by creating the following documents: mission, values, and by-laws. These groups often have a formalized leadership structure within the group and possibly accept dues to support virtual events.

HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATIONS (HOAs) A non-voluntary group of homeowners who live by a set of bylaws and regulations. HOAs are often initially established by a developer to help maintain the quality of a neighborhood and pay for additional infrastructure improvements. These groups pay a monthly fee and usually meet regularly.

what can

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS DO?



ADVOCATE

Work together to report crime, maintain the neighborhood, and discuss ways to improve the community.

BE INFORMED

Learn about county systems, apps, and other technology available to residents and work together to stay informed about county happenings and activities

CONNECT

Create virtual groups through social media to discuss and participate in neighborhood forums.

ENGAGE

Participate in Town Halls, Public Hearings, and other listening events the county holds.

ORGANIZE

Write and distribute neighborhood newsletters, flyers, and meet virtually about neighborhood news and events.

ACTIVITIES

Get together virtually by creating socially distanced bakes sales, virtual runs, clean-ups, and a variety of creative events that help everyone meet and greet safely.

CELEBRATE

Honor the neighborhood's unique characteristics and engage with the county to create a neighborhood plan.

RESEARCH

Learn about the neighborhood's history.

how to

START YOUR GROUP



While there are many types of Neighborhood Groups, this checklist provides the most basic structure to help neighborhoods start their own groups. As groups develop, opportunities to create more established and more formal groups, such as a neighborhood association and even a nonprofit, are possibilities. However, these formal processes are not necessary to become a recognized neighborhood group. Use the Neighborhood First Meeting Packet to guide your meeting. Utilize this packet to do the following:

- ▶ Create a collection of talents within the group. (Who is a social media guru? Who can blog or send out neighborhood letters? Who understands county codes?)
- ▶ Set up your group structure. You should have at least three contacts who can rotate meeting responsibilities to help ensure consistent and well-attended meetings.
- Create general meet times and structure.
- ► Create a contact list.
- Create an idea list of some activities you would like to do.
- ▶ Use Getting Started PDFs on page 15.

BLOCK PARTY IDEAS







Social distancing is necessary to keep us all safe during the COVID-19 public health crisis. With a little creativity, we can create connections while maintaining social-distancing guidelines. Re-imagine block party themes by encouraging porch or lawn activities that a block can do together while individuals stay on their properties. Utilize blogs, social media, and free meeting applications to stay connected and create online events for your neighborhood groups.

ANTI-CRIME WALK

Get together with your neighbors and take a socially distanced walk! Let everyone know neighbors are watching and ready to report crime using NextDoor. As you walk, drop off information on how to connect to the apps you are using to your group.

OUTDOOR BOOK SWAP

Host a table in your yard featuring all the books you're willing to exchange. Keeping a safe distance, browse your neighbor's tables for books that pique your interest. Leftover books after the event? No problem! Have a volunteer take those books to ARC or your charity of choice. This event does it all, supports neighbors, the environment, and the community.

socially distanced BLOCK PARTY IDEAS

BUBBLE DAYS

Who doesn't love bubbles? Bring out the kids and the kid in you to a socially distanced event filled with bubble fun! Check out this website for the ultimate <u>homemade</u> <u>bubble recipe</u> and encourage the neighborhood to create the ultimate bubble makers using recycled materials! Maybe even have a prize for the most creative bubble creator!

CHALK ART WALK

Fun for all ages. Utilize your sidewalks and turn it into an art gallery. You can even find judges to name winners in various age groups! Make sure judges maintain six feet of distance to make this a pandemic-friendly activity.

OUTDOOR CLOTHING SWAP

Just like the Book Swap, this event does it all and supports neighbors, the environment, and the community! You can theme your events and focus on kids clothes, work clothes, summer clothes, winter clothes, or just bring it all out! Bring some clothes take some clothes. Again, maintain social distance while shopping, and leftover clothes can be donated to charity.

DANCE THE NIGHT AWAY

Is there a local DJ in the neighborhood? Got speakers and Google Play? Host a fun and family friendly dance! You can theme the dances like '80s night, Prom Night, Tropical Night, etc. Bring the neighborhood together under outdoor lights and great music. To make this activity pandemic friendly, have each family stay in their front lawns for the dance party.

FAMILY DAY

Invite the zoo or local library to host an online event for your neighborhood. You can also take a virtual tour of many local, state, national, and international museums, parks, art installations, and more.

FARMERS MARKET

Adams County is home to a great many nurseries and farms. Bring one or a couple out to your neighborhood! hop for fresh produce while maintaining a safe distance of six feet. This is a great way to promote healthy living and savor local produce!

FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS TOUR AND CONTEST

Celebrate your neighborhood during the holiday season. Set a date that lets participating neighbors know when to have their decorations up. Host a socially distanced walking tour that ends with voting and hot chocolate! This is also an event that can have an online voting component.

SPRING SPRUCE UP

Host a neighborhood-wide, socially distanced clean-up event! Clean up trash around the sidewalks and common areas. Engage youth to help cut neighbors' lawns and pull weeds. Work together to make your neighborhood shine.

WALKING GROUP

Create a walking group that gets together to walk the neighborhood! Be sure to keep six feet of distance between you and neighbors outside of your household and wear personal protective equipment for health and safety.



NEIGHBORHOOD POLICY AGENDAS

When you fill out your Neighborhood Group Application, our process will help your neighborhood identify its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and challenges. It will also ask your group to identify things you would like to see—or not see—in your neighborhood. After your paperwork is submitted, a CSWB Coordinator will help you finalize this document. It will be featured on our community map, along with the contact information of the three co-chairs you have selected. The county will compile these individual policy agendas and generate a larger, comprehensive document for each neighborhood zone to be approved by Neighborhood Council Leadership. These larger collective policy agendas will be shared with county staff and leadership for additional guidance when working in each neighborhood zone.

ADAMS COUNTY GOVERNMENT CENTER

4430 S. ADAMS COUNTY PKWY., BRIGHTON

"Echoes of the Range" by award-winning artist, Douwe Blumberg, is an interior/exterior sculpture at the Adams County Government Center in Brighton. This stainless-steel work explores negative space and its connection to emotion and comfort. If you go, be sure to wander around the first floor to explore a variety of other installations by local Colorado artists. Judith Dickinson's "We, the People of Adams County" is made up of two large oil paintings full of real county residents!

ROTELLA PARK

1824 CORONADO PKWY. N., DENVER

Rotella Park in Welby is home to three kinetic sculptures by Colorado artist, John King. "Sky Writing," "Cloud Castle," and the "Sun, Moon and Stars Windvane" honor where the sky meets the grass and the wide open, natural field. Fun fact: One of these is interactive and you can spin it with your own kinetic force!





THE STANLEY MARKETPLACE

2501 N. DALLAS ST., AURORA

Adams County is the proud home of The Stanley Marketplace in Aurora, a collection of local businesses, artisans, and funky venues. This is a great place to wander around, have a snack, and explore the history of Stanley Aviation, where test planes took off and landed on the runway.

AAR RIVER GALLERY

THE MAGNOLIA STREET ART CENTER

The Magnolia Street Art Center in Derby is a co-working space for local artists, with about a dozen spaces hosting artists working in a variety of media. This innovative space is an inspiring nod to the homegrown arts in Adams County!



THE BRIGHTON ARMORY

300 STRONG ST., BRIGHTON

The Brighton Armory is a local treasure right here in our county seat. What was once headquarters for Company K, the 157th Infantry of the Colorado National Guard, is now a restored landmark that hosts concerts, theater, and visual art shows. The sound is incredible, the talent top notch, and the vibes are so great!

HISTORIC BROMLEY FARM

1594 E. BROMLEY LN., BRIGHTON

Adams County pride is in its farms, but have you heard about an innovative look at agriculture, called art & ag? With a focus on local food and artisan goods, Historic Bromley Farm hosts soap-making and herb-infused oils classes, along with field-to-table cooking classes and other events throughout the year!

RTD lightrail stations are always great places to spot artwork. Adams County is home to the Bimmer Torres mural at Pecos Junction Station, the collaborative piece by Bimmer Torres and Addison Carl at Clear Creek/Federal Station, and a Pat Milbury at the Westminster Station.

COMMERCE CITY

4540 GRAPE ST., DENVER

Head to Commerce City to check out the mural by Thomas Evans, aka Detour. This piece is a testament to our artist community and adds beauty to a traffic corridor through the city.



THE BISON RIDGE RECREATION CENTER

13905 E. 112TH AVE., COMMERCE CITY

The Bison Ridge Recreation Center in Commerce City is home to several pieces of public art — giant grazing metal buffalos and massive inspiring roundabout sculptures to name a couple.

CLEAR CREEK TRAIL

NEAR PECOS and 64TH

The Clear Creek trail near Pecos and 64th is home to an art installation made of tiles created by students from the Guardian Angels School.
